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On June 11, 1993, the Chimacum Custodial Maintenance Association (CCMA) filed a petition for investigation of a question concerning representation with the Public Employment Relations Commission, involving certain employees of the Chimacum School District. It appeared that the CCMA proposed to replace the Service Employees International Union as the exclusive bargaining representative of the employees involved.

The showing of interest submitted with the original petition was not in a form acceptable under the Commission's rules, and the Commission sent a letter to the employee who signed the petition on June 16, 1993, explaining that defect. The CCMA was given a period of 14 days to correct the deficiency in the showing of interest.

On June 23, 1993, the CCMA submitted a document containing multiple signatures. On June 24, 1993, the Commission sent a second letter to the petitioner, again explaining that the Commission's rules require individual cards or letters to constitute a proper showing of interest.

Individual documents filed with the Commission on June 29, 1993, indicated that employees did not want to be represented by Service Employees International Union, but failed to indicate support for

designation of the CCMA as the exclusive bargaining representative of the employees involved.<sup>1</sup>

The Executive Director has considered the matter and concludes that the petition should be dismissed. The petitioner has twice been given notice of defects in the showing of interest, and has had two opportunities to cure those defects. The fact remains, however, that there is no acceptable showing of interest supporting the petition.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is

ORDERED

The petition for investigation of a question concerning representation filed in the above-captioned matter is DISMISSED for insufficiency of showing of interest.
